Hackensack Middle School Summer Assignment Grade 8 Language Arts

In an effort to encourage reading for pleasure and develop lifelong independent readers, all incoming 8th graders will be required to complete this summer assignment. This assignment is due on Friday, September 9, 2016. This assignment will be worth a test grade. The suggested novels attached are available at Johnson Free Public Library, or students may purchase their own copy.

Part I. Summer Reading

- Choose one of the suggested novels on the list attached. Please take note of the lexile levels when choosing your book- using your last SRI score, try to find a close match.
- As you read, be sure to annotate (taking notes on characterization, questions you may have, predictions, etc.) the text.

Part II. Literary Analysis Essay

- Choose one of the essay topics below and write a five paragraph literary analysis essay based on your novel.
- Use the Literary Analysis Essay Outline to help plan and organize your essay. Refer to the Literary Analysis Essay sample to help you.

Essay Topics

- 1. Every author has certain themes(ex.struggle,triumph,quest for justice,survival, friendship, freedom, etc.) that he or she portrays through his or her writing. Identify a theme in the novel and write an essay demonstrating the message the author wants to convey. How are the main characters impacted by this theme?
- 2. Authors often use symbolism to convey ideas and themes in their novels. Identify three uses of symbolism in the novel and explain which symbols were used and what they symbolized.
- 3. The development of the protagonist (main character) in a novel enhances our understanding of the story plot. Identify how the protagonist changes throughout the course of the novel.
- 4. Characters often grow and plots are developed through the author's use of conflict. Identify and explain three different forms of conflict that are evident in the novel.

Helpful Hints

- 1. Try your best to use sophisticated vocabulary, appropriate grammar/sentence structure, and proofread your essay for any mechanical (spelling, capitalization, punctuation) errors.
- 2. Be sure to use textual evidence in your body paragraphs to support your thesis.
- 3. Essay should be typed in font size 12 and be double-spaced.

Literary Analysis Essay Outline

If you are having trouble writing your literary analysis essay, use this outline to help provide structure and organization in planning your essay.

Paragraph # 1 (Introduction)

- Hook- begin your essay with an engaging hook.
- Identify title and author of work.
- Provide three to four sentence summary of novel.
- Thesis statement- this should be the answer to one of the essay topic questions provided for you.

Paragraph # 2 (Support # 1)

- Topic sentence- identifies topic of paragraph.
- Supporting details- sentences that support your topic sentence, using text citations (both quoting and paraphrasing).
- Analysis and interpretation of the supporting evidence to demonstrate how it supports your thesis.

Paragraph # 3 (Support # 2)

- Topic sentence- identifies topic of paragraph.
- Supporting details- sentences that support your topic sentence, using text citations (both quoting and paraphrasing).
- Analysis and interpretation of the supporting evidence to demonstrate how it supports your thesis.

Paragraph # 4 (Support # 3)

- Topic sentence- identifies topic of paragraph.
- Supporting details- sentences that support your topic sentence, using text citations (both quoting and paraphrasing).
- Analysis and interpretation of the supporting evidence to demonstrate how it supports your thesis.

Paragraph # 5 (Conclusion)

- Re-state thesis statement.
- Re-state three arguments that support the thesis. Make a text to world or text to text connection.
- Provide a closing sentence.
