

- Students will continue to be engaged in rigorous and relevant learning but in a smaller and more personal environment.

Guide to Freshman Year

Welcome to your first year at Hackensack High School! The choices that you make this year will impact your post-high school options. Take advantage of all that Hackensack High School has to offer by following these guidelines.

Meet with your Guidance Counselor: You have been assigned a counselor who will help you create a flexible 4-year plan, which will guide you to achieve your goals of graduation and post secondary education. Your counselor will also help you select courses for your sophomore year schedule. The guidance staff will support you academically, personally and socially.

Maintain a strong Grade Point Average (GPA): Beginning this year, all of your high school final grades will be officially documented on your transcript. GPA at Hackensack High School is not weighted. GPA is calculated by multiplying the numerical equivalent for each letter grade by the credits earned per course. This total is then divided by the total credits earned for the year. Listed below are the numerical equivalents for each letter grade:

A/A+ = 4.0 B/B+ = 3.0 C/C+ = 2.0 D/D+ = 1.0 F = 0

Make Up Credit: Freshmen must earn a minimum of 30 Credits in order to obtain Sophomore status. Failed courses must be made up in summer and/or using the computer-based program called EDUCERE. Speak to your counselor about opportunities to recover credit.

Testing:

Biology End of Course Exam: Biology EOC is a state mandated test given to all students in an Biology course in May.

ACCESS Testing: ESL/Bilingual students participate in the ACCESS test which evaluates their reading, writing, listening and speaking abilities in English.

Get Involved!: Hackensack High School offers a variety of opportunities to get involved in sports, clubs, leadership, and volunteer work. These activities help you stay involved in your school and community and round out your resume when applying for post-secondary schools and scholarships.

Create a Student Activity Profile: Begin to create a Student Activity Profile which documents your activities, community involvement, honors and awards. The completed product will help you to demonstrate your strengths when applying for colleges, scholarships and employment.

Naviance Career and College Exploration: The Naviance Program is designed to assist you in developing a post-secondary plan. It includes a step-by-step checklist to follow during your four years at Hackensack High School. Through Naviance, students can take interest inventories and personality tests. They can also explore college and career options. Attend local college fairs, including the HHS Annual College Fair in the fall. Visit college campuses by attending open houses and campus tours. Begin to work on your college essays and finalize your college choices by September of senior year. Begin to request teacher/counselor recommendations for college applications by filling out a Student Fact Sheet.

Scheduling: Choose electives in which you have an interest and which may lead to a possible college major or career.

Prepare for eligibility for College Athletics: If you plan to participate in college athletics, you will need to ensure that you are taking appropriate classes and maintain a minimum GPA of a 2.3 as required by the NCAA guidelines. - 3 years of Mathematics (Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2)
- 3 years of Science (Biology, Chemistry, and Physics)
- 3 years of History (2 years of US History, 1 year of World History)
- 1 year of World Language (Spanish, French, or Italian)
- 1 year of Personal Finance or a Business Education class
- 1 year of Fine, Practical, Performing Arts
- A passing score the High School Proficiency Assessment (HSPA) in Language Arts and Mathematics
- A minimum of 120 credits

Guía para el estudiante de primer año

Bienvenidos al primer año de estudios secundarios en Hackensack High School. Ahora eres un "*freshman*." Cada decisión que tomes este año va a influenciar tus oportunidades al terminar tus estudios. Aprovecha todo lo que Hackensack High School ofrece a sus estudiantes y sigue las siguientes normas:

Reúnete con tu consejera para crear un plan de estudios para que tus cuatro años aquí te ayuden a alcanzar tu meta de recibir un diploma de estudios secundarios y continuar con tu educación después de que te recibas. Tu consejera también te ayudara a seleccionar cursos para tu horario del próximo año. Su tarea es apoyarte tanto en tu vida académica, personal y social.

Mantén un promedio alto de calificaciones. El *GPA* (grade point average) es tu promedio de calificaciones. Al final de este año, y todos los demás años escolares, tus calificaciones finales de cada curso aparecerán en un documento oficial que se conoce como tu "*transcript*" o registro de calificaciones. La palabra "*crédito*" se refiere a una unidad de valor que se le da a un curso y se utiliza para indicar que se han cumplido con los requisitos de graduación). El promedio de calificaciones ("*GPA*") se calcula sumando el valor numérico de cada calificación (A, B, C, D, o F) que recibas por cada curso y luego dividiendo ese total por el total de clases cursadas. Por ejemplo:

A/A+ vale 4.0 puntos B/B+ vale 3.0 puntos C/C+ vale 2.0 puntos D/D+ vale 1.0 punto F vale 0 puntos

Recupera los créditos. Todos los estudiantes deben haber acumulado un mínimo de 30 créditos al término del noveno grado para pasar a ser un "sophmore" o sea, estudiante de décimo grado. Siempre que pierdas una clase, recupera esos créditos asistiendo a la escuela de verano o con los cursos computarizados de EDUCERE. Habla con tu consejera acerca de tus opciones.

Exámenes:

Examen final de biología: El examen Biología EOC es una prueba estatal obligatoria que se le administra a todos los estudiantes de biología en el mes de mayo.

Examen ACCESS: Los estudiantes en el programa bilingüe toman cada año un examen que se conoce como el ACCESS el cual evalúa la aptitud del estudiante en inglés tanto en la lectura, la escritura, la comprensión oral y la habilidad de expresión verbal.

Participa en actividades. Aquí en Hackensack High School existen múltiples oportunidades de mantenerse activo en los deportes, en actividades voluntarias o como miembros de grupos de intereses específicos o "clubs." Esas actividades te ayudarán a ser parte integral de la comunidad y de tu escuela, a la vez que te permiten acumular experiencia que te abrirá oportunidades de becas y de ser admitido a escuelas de estudios post-secundarios.

Crea tu récord de actividades estudiantiles: Crea un expediente donde acumules información de todas tus actividades y de tu participación en la vida escolar y comunitaria, detallando los premios y distinciones que recibas, de modo que, cuando te vayas a recibir, puedas mostrar tu record de logros a aquellas instituciones donde quieras continuar con tus estudios post-secundarios o donde vayas a solicitar trabajo.

Empieza a explorar carreras y escuelas de estudios post-secundarios: No creas que sea demasiado temprano para empezar a investigar tus opciones de carreras y de escuelas donde continuar estudiando. El Internet es un medio estupendo para empezar con tu búsqueda. El programa de Internet Naviance ha sido diseñado para ayudarte a diseñar tus planes de estudios post-secundarios. Dicho programa incluye una lista de pasos a seguir durante tus cuatro años aquí en Hackensack High School. Por medio de Naviance, el estudiante puede completar cuestionarios acerca de los intereses y características personales que pueden ayudarlo a definir el tipo de carrera a seguir y también explorar sus opciones de instituciones educacionales. Asiste a la feria universitaria que Hackensack High School organiza anualmente y usa todas las oportunidades que tengas de visitar universidades o institutos técnicos donde ofrezcan programas de estudios que te interesen.

Selección de clases: Cuando elijas tus clases, discute con tu consejera tus intereses para que tus cursos te ayuden a explorar áreas de estudios post-secundarios y de una posible carrera.

Nota para los atletas. Si te interesa participar en deportes en la universidad necesitas asegurarte que tienes las clases apropiadas y mantener un promedio (GPA) mínimo de 2.3 en tus notas, como lo requiere la NCAA (Nacional Collegiate Athletic Association/Asociación nacional de atletismo universitario). Requisitos de graduación

- 4 años de educación física
- 3 semestres de salud
- 1 semestre de educación para el permiso de conducir
- 4 años de inglés
- 3 años de matemática (algebra 1, geometría, algebra 2)
- 3 años de ciencia (biología, química y física)
- 3 años de historia (2 años de historia norteamericana y 1 año de historia mundial)
- 1 año de una lengua extranjera (español, francés o italiano)
- Una clase de comercio o tecnología
- 1 año de bellas artes o artes prácticas.
- Aprobar el examen HSPA (High School Proficiency Assessment) que evalúa tus aptitudes en el lenguaje y la matemática en el tercer año.

Hackensack High School Guidance Policies

Class Rank

- Class rank is computed for seniors at the end of the 6th and 7th semesters.
- Fall rank is calculated by October 1, based upon the final grades in all courses completed at that point.
- Spring rank is calculated after mid-year grades are finalized.
- All students registered by September 15 of their senior year will be included in senior rank.
- Any student registered after September 15 of their senior year WILL NOT be included in senior rank.
- Course credits are multiplied by the weighted value indicated in the table below. The cumulative total is then divided by the total credits attempted, including failures.
- The following quality point index is used:

- Level 1 courses include Advanced Placement (AP), Pre AP, Honors, and Middle College courses.
- Level 2 courses include College Preparatory and elective courses.
- Level 3 courses include Non-College Preparatory courses including Physical Education, Health, Drivers Education, Cooperative, Vocational, ESL, and Resource courses.

Course Audit

- A student may audit a class by officially registering for a class without earning a letter grade or credit with permission from the Guidance Supervisor.
- A student must obtain fill out a "Course Audit Form" signed by the Guidance Supervisor, parent and student in order to audit a course.
- A student auditing a course must adhere to school attendance policy.
- A student auditing a course is responsible for all assignments, testing and class preparation required of the other members of the class.
- The audited course will appear on a student's transcript with an "N" grade.
- No credit is earned, and the student's grade-point average is not affected.
- Exceptions to the rule shall be made, under extenuating circumstances, with the permission of the Principal.

Course Failure

- A student who fails one or more courses during a school year must accept the responsibility of repeating the course in summer school.
- Students may only attend a board approved summer school. A list of the board approved summer schools are located on the Hackensack High School Guidance website.
- Summer school tuition and fees are the responsibility of the student.
- Summer school courses will be added to a student's transcript upon successful completion of the course and will be designated with an SS.
- Failed course will not be removed from a student's transcript.

Course Withdrawal

- A student must carry a minimum of 32 credits for the school year.
- Any course change before September 30th will not be recorded on a student's transcript. No course withdrawals will be permitted after September 30th.
- Exceptions to the rule shall be made, under extenuating circumstances, with the permission of the Principal. In the event that a change of schedule is recommended by the Principal, any course dropped after the above-mentioned date shall result in a withdrawn failing or withdrawn passing recorded on a student's transcript. Any dropped course requires written permission from a parent or guardian. Students are to continue attending course as an audit and will not receive credit for the course.

Grade Point Average

- Grade Point Average is not weighted.
- GPA is computed for all students using final grades.
- Course credits are multiplied by the numeric value indicated in the table below.
- The cumulative total is then divided by the total credits attempted, including failures.
- The following quality point index is used:

Honor Roll

- Honor Roll is calculated after grading closes for Marking Periods 1,2 and 3.
- Honor Roll certificates are distributed by Guidance staff.
- The following criteria are used to determine Honor Roll:
 - o Blue Honor Roll Marking Period Grade Point Average 3.0 3.49
 - Gold Honor Roll Marking Period Grade Point Average 3.5 4.0

Schedule Change

- Student schedule changes will only be honored during the month of August and September by filing a "Schedule Change Form" in the Guidance Office.
- Students may not request a change based on preferences for teachers or lunch periods.
- Students who failed a course under a specific staff member may request a course section change.
- Student requested schedule changes will not be honored during the school year unless there is a scheduling error.
- Students may not change to another section of a course for any reason other than safety and/or security.
- Students may drop to a lower level course within the same content area at the discretion of the Department Supervisor with written parental permission.

 Exceptions to the rule shall be made, under extenuating circumstances, with the permission of the Principal.

School Registration

- A student under age 18 who intends to register into school must present themselves in the guidance office accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.
- Students aged 18 or older may legally sign themselves into school.
- Registration Packet must be filled out completely.
- In addition to the registration packet, the following information must be provided:
 - School records
 - Medical form
 - Proof of birth
 - o Proof of residence
 - Photo ID of parent
 - Guardianship papers if necessary
- Upon registration, student must complete placement tests.

School Withdrawal

- A student under age 18 who intends to withdraw from school must present themselves in the guidance office accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.
- Students aged 18 or older may legally sign themselves out of school.
- Student and parent will be required to fill out release cards.
- Student must return all books and settle all fines.
- Student records will only be released upon successful completion of above procedure.

Transcripts

- Student transcripts are confidential documents.
- A student, parent, or legal guardian may request a copy of his/her own transcript from the guidance office.
- A student must have a completed transcript request form on file in order to have a transcript released to a third party.
