Redbull Program at Jackson Avenue School

However, there are many other facets of learning and wellbeing that schools support. These other areas of learning are not tested, but they are critical to student growth and development. These facets include emotional, physical, and social learning.

In support of these areas of learning, *Wendy Lamparelli*, Jackson Avenue School's nurse, is a passionate crusader. She is currently tackling many health issues faced by students in our community--one of which is obesity. This summer Ms. Lamparelli contacted Sips and Kicks (https://www.facebook.com/Sips-Kicks-897386400302565/timeline/) a not for profit smoothie company offering healthy smoothies to low income students. Each Monday Chad Dichtenberg and Andy Pada, creators of Sips & Kicks, delivers fresh fruit and vegetable smoothies to our students. What's more... the students LOVE them. They are sipping kale, pineapples, mangoes, and bananas--a much more beneficial breakfast than the traditional bowl of sugary cereal. A healthy breakfast impacts the student's emotional, physical, and academic learning for the rest of the day.





Another program in which Ms. Lamparelli brought to Jackson Avenue School is the RED BULL Gym Takeover program. This program started on September 26 and will last throughout the year. The goal is to increase student awareness of soccer and to expose the children to professional players. During physical education classes students participate in soccer training with professional players from the Red Bull Team. Anthony and Nicole, Jackson Avenue School trainers, offer physical education in a way that students enjoy, but also support social learning through working together as a team. Students are taught the moves, terms, and goals of soccer, but emphasis is on working as a team. Students must work together to get the goal--emphasizing the physical and social aspects of learning.

Ms. Lamparelli's goals for these programs are to see improvement in students emotional, physical, and social well being. We are often so involved in seeing how students "test" we forget that part of learning starts with being happy, fit, and friendly. We are indebted to Ms. Lamparelli for finding ways in which to support students through all facets of learning-emotional, physical, social and academic.

Nellie K. Parker 35th Renaming Anniversary Celebration Article

Nellie K. Gets Her Day

On the evening of September 20th, 2016, students, staff (current and past), and community members packed the Thelma C. Smith Auditorium at Nellie K. Parker School in Hackensack, New Jersey. Those in attendance and those participating were paying homage to the school's namesake, Nellie Katherine Morrow Parker. The program marked the 35th anniversary of the renaming of Maple Hill School to honor Mrs. Parker, the first African American teacher in Bergen County. NKP Fourth grade teacher Toney Jackson put the program together with the help of current and former staff members, several of whom participated in the event. The program honored the legacy of Mrs. Parker, as well as those who have helped to keep her legacy alive for the past 35 years as staff members or supporters of the Hackensack elementary school. Former assistant principals Robert Corrado and Ann Small spoke



of their recollections of the school and staff; and The Honorable Judge Sandra Robinson who was on the renaming committee in 1981, spoke about her personal experiences with Mrs. Parker, and how her values, and impact continue to live on in the legacy she left behind.

Hackensack Board of Education Vice President Lara Rodruiguez presented commendations from the Bergen Country

Freeholders acknowledging the significance of the event, and declaring September 20th to be Nellie K. Parker School Day in Bergen County. The crowd roared with approval and joy. Jackson, the organizer and host, read an original poem about Mrs. Parker and her significance. Retired Hackensack teacher Rosemary Flowers-Jackson wrote a powerful litany for Nellie K. Parker, which was read by NKP staff member Frank Rovell.

Several Parker teachers sang a beautiful selection which was written by NKP music teacher Diana Gross. The singers (Saran Sinnette, Terrell Lampley, Myrna Gotrell, and Brenda Walker) accompanied Gross in a stirring song about keeping Mrs. Parker's dream alive, and keeping the fire burning within us all. Art Teacher Cheryll Parisi was honored for her tenure as the longest serving active teacher at Nellie K. Parker. Parisi has been working in this historic school for over 30 years.



After the program, current and former staff members joined together, embraced each other, and shared fond memories and refreshments. A committee is already being assembled to make sure that this day each year is celebrated, and Nellie K. Parker's values, and impact are honored and carried forward.


