Bee-havior

Of the 20,000 species of bees in the world, only one makes honey. The honeybee is a social insect that lives and works with others in large groups or colonies. A typical honeybee colony is made up of one gueen bee and her offspring: hordes of female worker bees and several hundred male drones. Their home is a hive, which contains a honeycomb. A close examination of a

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honeycomb shows a series of six-sided cubicles; or cells, that are used for storing honey and raising young bees. Generally, the cells with the young bees are in the center of the hive and

the storage cells are on the periphery.



Most beekeepers work in protective clothing.

Laying eggs is the queen bee's only (10)function. The drones' sole responsibility is to mate with the queen—in most cases, the queen of another colony. Unlike the queen and the drones, the worker bees have heterogeneous functions. For example, the (15)worker bees gather nectar, convert the nectar to honey, and feed both the young honeybees and the drones. They also keep the hive clean, build new honeycombs, and stand guard at the hive entrance to ward off (20)predators. For the worker bees, there is no

relief from drudgery. Their labor is necessary to the success of the hive, and without them, the queen's offspring would perish.

Some people raise bees commercially for their honey. Others keep bees as a hobby. Contrary to popular belief, honeybees are relatively easy to handle, and (25)their sting is relatively harmless, if painful. Experienced beekeepers do not scuttle away from swarming bees. Knowing that quick movements disturb bees, they move slowly and deliberately. While most wear protective clothing, a few brave souls prefer to handle their bees with bare hands!
