Safe Return Plan

In accordance with the New Jersey Department of Education and New Jersey Department of Health’s “*The Road Forward: Health and Safety Guidance for the 2021-2022 School Year*” document, **Hackensack Public Schools will open in September for full time, full day, in-person instruction with no remote option.**



Maintaining Health & Safety

A. Universal and correct wearing of masks

All students and staff are required to wear masks that adequately cover both the nose and mouth at all times with a few exceptions. For example:

- When doing so would inhibit the individual's health, such as when the individual is exposed to extreme heat indoors;
- When the individual is engaged in activity that cannot physically be performed while wearing a mask, such as eating or drinking, or playing a musical instrument that would be obstructed by a face covering;
- In general, students and staff may remove their masks outdoors, unless they are involved in activities that require sustained close contact with other people.



Maintaining Health & Safety

B. Physical distancing

All classrooms, cafeterias, testing and therapy rooms at Hackensack Public schools will have students seated according to NJDOH regulations **between three and six feet apart wherever practicable**. When schools cannot maintain three to six feet of social distancing, schools, as deemed appropriate by Building Principals, will implement strategies to maximize opportunities to increase distance between students such as:

- Face desks in the same direction
- Avoid grouped seating arrangements
- Have students sit only on one side of the table
- Use physical barriers or desk shields



Maintaining Health & Safety

C. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette

Students will continue to receive training and reinforcement on proper hand washing techniques with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.

Hand sanitizing stations containing at least 60% alcohol have been placed strategically in all classrooms, high population areas such as, offices, entrances/exits, restrooms, and cafeteria.

Signage on proper handwashing technique is posted in all bathrooms and above all hand washing stations.



Maintaining Health & Safety

D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation

All classrooms, and other areas occupied by students or staff, shall be routinely cleaned and disinfected with an EPA-registered product for use against SARS-CoV-2.

All custodians have been trained in proper cleaning procedures.

Frequently touched areas such as doorknobs, lockers, water fountains, sinks, light switches, railings, elevators, lab equipment, etc. shall be cleaned multiple times per day whenever possible, but at least once daily.



Maintaining Health & Safety

D. Continued

HVAC equipment is regularly inspected, repaired, and replaced as required.

The District is actively looking to install new classroom unit ventilators, and improved HVAC systems for all instructional spaces over time with the current Energy Savings Improvement Program (ESIP) project and new ESSER funds. These improvements should begin during the upcoming school year and be completed within the next three years.



Maintaining Health & Safety

D. Continued

Schools will improve airflow to the extent possible to increase circulation of outdoor air, increase the delivery of clean air, and dilute potential contaminants. This will be achieved through several strategies:

- Bring in as much outdoor air as possible by opening windows and doors to increase outdoor airflow, where possible. Schools will not open windows or doors if doing so poses a safety or health risk (such as falling, exposure to extreme temperatures, or triggering asthma symptoms), or if doing so would otherwise pose a security risk.
- Consider having activities, classes, or lunches outdoors when circumstances allow.



Maintaining Health & Safety

E. Contact tracing is a strategy used to determine the source of an infection and how it is spreading.

All HPS nurses completed a contact tracing certification course.

Per the CDC, close contact is defined as being within 6 feet of someone with suspected or known COVID-19 for 15 or more minutes during a 24-hour period.

Exception: In the K-12 indoor classroom setting, the close contact definition excludes students who were within 3 to 6 feet of an infected student (laboratory-confirmed or a clinically compatible illness) where both the infected student and the exposed student(s) correctly and consistently wore well-fitting masks the entire time. This exception does not apply to teachers, staff, or other adults in the indoor classroom setting.(updated 8/21)



With guidance from the LHD, schools will notify parents and staff of close contact exposure and exclusion requirements while maintaining confidentiality.

Maintaining Health & Safety

F. Diagnostic and Screening Testing

Daily screener email will no longer be utilized. Parents/caregivers (and Staff) will be asked to complete a COVID-19 screener attestation form at the beginning of the school year or commencement of their child's schooling (employment) to ensure that their child (they) will not attend school if they are ill.

Parents/caregivers (Staff) will be strongly encouraged to monitor their children (Self) for signs of illness on a daily basis as they are the front line for assessing illness in their children (themselves). Students (staff) who are sick should not attend school. All schools will strictly enforce exclusion criteria for both students and staff.

F. Diagnostic and Screening Testing (continued)

COVID-19 Testing will be available on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 11 am to 4 pm at no cost to students or staff at the following locations as indicated below:

- Mondays – Hackensack High School
- Wednesdays – Hackensack Middle School
- Fridays – Jackson Avenue School



Maintaining Health & Safety

- G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible

Hackensack Public Schools will continue to share where vaccines are administered and seek out opportunities for students and staff to be vaccinated.

As per Governor Murphy's announcement today, August 23rd, all preschool through 12 school personnel are required to complete a full vaccination course or undergo regular testing at a minimum of once to twice per week. Full compliance is required by October 18th. Specific details to follow...



Maintaining Health & Safety

H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies

Accommodations for children with disabilities are and will continue to be made according to their Individualized Educational Plans.



Ensuring Continuity of Services

A. Describe how the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address students' academic needs and students' and staffs social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services.

A few examples:

- After school tutoring is being offered to targeted students from October through May 3 days/week.
- Food services including free breakfast and lunch will continue throughout the 2021-22 school year.
- Intramural sports will be offered at the middle school.
- The district is in the process of hiring intervention teachers and additional social workers at the elementary schools to focus on learning loss and to support student and staff mental health respectively.
- District partnered with Care Solace to support student and staff mental health needs.



Public Comment

A. Describe how the LEA sought public comment on its plan, and how it took those public comment into account in the development of its plan.

The plan was reviewed at the June 21 Board of Education meeting for public comment. The District Reopening Committee met on August 4, 2021 to review the plan for the 2021/2022 school-year. Subsequently, a Google Form that included a link to the plan was shared with all stakeholders to obtain public comment on any and all sections of the plan.



Public Comment

B.
